SISS MTB Championships

A team of five represented GBHS at the South Island Secondary Schools Mountain Bike Champs at Coronet Peak in Queenstown. The competition ran over 3 days and included three disciplines: Cross Country (XC), Downhill (DH) and Enduro.

Coronet Peak has a wide variety of dedicated MTB tracks for use during the summer. This made for an awesome event location with chairlift and road access to a variety of tracks used during the event, all in a stunning alpine environment. The event village was set up around the Coronet base building which allowed great viewing of the downhill course and the finish point for all events. Marshalls & supporters were rewarded with spectacular views of the Queenstown area, the beautiful alpine summer environment and fantastic riding action.

Participants were able to use the chairlift to access the higher trails, and the team took full advantage of this, several times riding the full 1200m descent from the top of the chairlift to the valley floor (Dirt serpent to Rude rock to Morning glory to Hot rod). Bike fever was evident - it was hard to get the team to stop for food and drink with the opportunity to ride such awesome trails on the unofficial practice day.

Cross Country

Definitely not anyone in the teams' favourite event - unless they were keeping their love for punishing uphill climbs a secret. The under 15 boys declared their goal to "not look like XC riders". The Coronet XC course was not typically undulating but instead incorporated 2 big climbs across 4WD and single track - one long and constant followed by a fast downhill run of XC trail, and the second very steep and twisty up Rude Rock with a fun technical descent. (Rude Rock. IFKYK).

The dedicated XC riders (Road cyclists in disguise) were out in force in their Lycra, a somewhat intimidating bunch. They





mostly dominated the climbs but the team were delighted to smoke them on the technical downhill descent.

GBHS also entered a team in the U16 relay: Layton, Kye and Wylie. The event manual said teams of 3 with one lap each, but as the team lined up the Commissaires declared 4 laps with one rider going twice. Because Layton & Kye were competing in the DH the next day Wylie offered to do the 4th lap, he emptied the tank to bring the team home in 13th place.

The DH course took an L5 Black Downhill trail, descending 400m from the top of Coronet peak chairlift to the base building. The track was fast with technical flow, and was dry and dusty which impacted the course over the week with nearly 400 riders continually sending it.

There were many broken bikes and a few broken bodies with many scrubbing out of competition due to crashing on practice or seeding runs. Layton had a particularly gnarly crash in his seeding run, breaking both his helmet and neck brace - both of which are compulsory protective gear. He showed real grit to complete his race run later in the day with hired gear.

The skill and bravery of the DH riders was awesome to see, the overall fastest run in the DH was by a Queenstown local who ripped down the course in a phenomenal 2 mins 54 seconds.

Enduro

The Enduro took place across 4 timed stages incorporating blue L3 and L4 tracks: Dirt Serpent, Rude Rock, Morning Glory and XC trail. Competitors used a combination of peddling, van shuttle and chairlift to access each of the stages. In a nice end to the competition, riders started each stage in their school groups because "Enduro is for riding with your mates". Overall it was a worthwhile experience to participate in an official Cycling NZ event, with the added bonus to ride in and around the Queenstown lakes district. Some team members also rode at Bike Glendhu near Wanaka, and checked out the amazing jump park at Gorge Road.
