This is just a quick note from the Board to update students and whānau about the Principal recruitment process in progress.

Shortly after Linda announced her resignation about 3 weeks ago, the decision was made to employ a recruitment agent to help with the expected work load and ensure professionalism.

We found a very experienced and highly recommended consultant in Terri Johnstone with her company Catalyst for Change (<u>c4change</u>).

An ad in the Education Gazette for the position of Prinicpal/ Tumuaki at GBHS has gone online last Friday. It is linked to an application pack for potential applicants which can be viewed/downloaded from our school website (<u>application</u> <u>pack</u>). The applications are open until November 10th.

The Board will use the time until then to consult with students, staff AND whānau, i.e. you!

We want to know what kind of skills and experience you would like to see in the new Principal and where you like to see education at GBHS heading.

All going well we will email a link out to all whānau which takes you to a very short confidential and anonymous online survey.

A similar survey will be send to staff and Board members. Student consultation will happen within school under the guidance of Catalyst for Change and lead by our staff and student Trustees.

The results of those surveys will be used as selection criteria to inform the shortlisting and will be used in the interviews.

There will also be a brief time at the beginning of our next Board meeting end of this month when whānau will be given the opportunity to speak to the Board about their hopes and expectations for the future Principal.

GOLDEN BAY HIGH SCHOOL DRESS CODE – NO UNIFORM

This dress code applies to all students who have permission to not wear uniform. This applies to Year 12, Year 13, on a student's birthday and designated non uniform days. Students should be practically and economically dressed in a manner that allows students and parents some choice whilst feeling comfortable and confident within themselves. The choice of clothing should be neat, clean and appropriate for both school life and everyday work.

AIMS OF GUIDELINES

To ensure safety, to prevent clothing giving offence, and to clarify expectations of appropriateness for everyday work.

GUIDELINES:

- 1. Clothing will not carry offensive messages or pictures, or slogans relating to alcohol and other drugs.
- 2. Footwear must be worn.
- 3. Clothing and jewellery must be safe for the environment in which it will be worn.
- 4. Clothing permitted:
 - a. Trousers/jeans
 - b. Shorts/skirts/dresses which cover upper legs
 - c. Tops which:
 - i. Cover shoulders, back and chest. An example is a T-shirt
 - ii. Are tucked in or reach lower than the top of the trousers/jeans/shorts/skirt
 - iii. Cannot be seen through.

NCEA Exams Start 6th of November

The last day for Seniors will be the end of Wk 3, **Friday 27th of October.**

NCEA exams begin for Yr 11-13 students in Wk 5 of this Term from the **6**th **November**.

Exam Tutorials and Internal Assessment Completion Workshops will begin Wk 4 and a schedule of the first two weeks will be sent to all parents this week, along with the exam timetable.

For the exams students will need to bring their exam slip, a clear plastic bag, a number of pens and any subject specific equipment such as calculators, rulers or coloured pencils. Students who are entered in a digital exam will be expected to bring in their own device also.

Buses will operate as normal during these times with morning exams beginning at 930 am and afternoon exams from 2pm. We would expect all students to arrive at their exam 30 mins prior to the exam start time.
