Swimming sports feedback and plan for 2024

Summary of Feedback

Feedback was invited by whānau through an email and via Goldie, by students through some PE classes and Student Executive, and from staff.

Feedback was received from 10 whānau, with a combination of positives, negatives and suggestions for the future. To summarise the whānau feedback, three were unhappy with whānau not being invited to all sessions, one with the seating, two with technical concerns, whilst two whānau specifically supported the changed format and two others were extremely positive about the overall event.

Feedback from students was overwhelmingly positive. The format of the whole school watching for session 3 only was strongly supported. Some students specifically appreciated being able to compete without any non-competing spectators whereas some others expressed disappointment their whānau couldn't see them in a morning event.

Staff feedback was positive with a similar range of specific feedback to students and whānau.

Plan for 2024:

This will again be a school house swimming event

- 1. Continue with 100m finals during a lunchtime with any spectators welcome.
- 2. Continue with student competitors only (rather than student non-competitors) at the two morning sessions. The whole school will attend the afternoon session in house colours etc.
- 3. Run session one in the morning without adult spectators, allowing students who want to compete without a non-competing audience to have that opportunity.
- 4. Invite whānau to session two in the morning and ensure it has a popular event in it so that all students have the opportunity to compete in front of whānau.
- 5. Implement some of the technical suggestions, including a better loud speaker system for the finals.
- 6. Invite whānau to enter a team in the Year 13/staff event.

fortnightly on Tuesdays next term from 1-2pm (lunch break). Please check with the school office for directions to the Uniform Shop.




Equitable Transitions Strategy Hui - Our journey to a low emissions future.

Last Monday Rosie, Kiki and Molly went to a Hui at the community center. The Ministry for the Environment and Ministry for Social Development were carrying out community consultation throughout Aotearoa about what could be done to help communities transition to a low carbon economy/society in a way that would not leave groups of people and regions behind.

In the Hui we discussed our concerns as we travel towards a low emissions future. Some things that we bought up were how everybody could achieve this financially and how we could bring this change into our school. We went on to discuss solutions, some of which included encouraging people of the community to grow their own food, cheaper options of electric public/shared transport and more education within our school on the climate emergency.



They are coming back in June to present the draft strategy and we are excited to see what our input has helped to create. As students whose futures highly depend on how we battle climate change it was a privilege to attend this Hui, and we will keep striving for a better future. *Rosie Brown*
