
Y13 Biology Class Explores Mussel Workshop at Cawthron Aquaculture Park

The Y13 Biology class recently embarked on an exciting two-day adventure in Nelson, where they participated in the Mussel Workshop held at Cawthron Aquaculture Park. This hands-on experience allowed students to delve into the intriguing world of New Zealand Green Lipped Mussels (Perna canaliculus) and their responses to various environmental conditions. Assisted by esteemed scientists from Otago University and Cawthron Institute, the students conducted experiments to investigate these fascinating organisms.

NMIT generously opened their Aquaculture laboratory doors to accommodate the class, providing a specialized setting for scientific exploration. This unique opportunity enabled the students to engage in relevant scientific research within a professional laboratory environment, enhancing their understanding of biological concepts and methodologies.

The students thoroughly enjoyed the experience of working in a novel setting, surrounded by experts in the field.

There were 23 teams including the reigning national champs, Motueka high school (who entered 3 teams). Our team was the 8th school in the mixed race and 15th overall.
