Thank you Coralie, BoT and SLT

I have returned back to GBHS refreshed after a fabulous Sabbatical. This is my 24th year of being a Principal so it was good

to have a break to step back and take a breath. A huge thank you in particular to Coralie Stopford for taking over the Principal's role, and to Gerard Tindling and Dan Padial for stepping up and supporting her.

The Sabbatical award has two parts to it. The first is 5 weeks of study and the second is 5 weeks of recreation/non work.

During my study I looked in particular at Careers Education, and how we can better support students, (especially Māori and other minority group students) to think outside the 'tram tracks' of their own lives. This is especially challenging in an isolated rural area such as Mohua. I based my research question on the Doctoral Thesis by Dr. Cadence Kaumoana about the value of teaching mindset skills to Secondary students. I visited 14 schools and had a further 13 hui with educators as well as completing guite a bit of professional reading! Whilst visiting schools I saw a wide range of really interesting practice, not just around careers!

John and I travelled overseas during my 'recreation' time. The primary purpose

was to visit our youngest son who works for MFAT in Egypt. We also went to

Singapore, Israel, Kygryzstan, Kazakhstan and South Korea. Aren't I fortunate!

We are so appreciative of the clean air and clean water we have come home to.

2022 NCEA results

2022 was another challenging year, but our NCEA results are solid and at at Level 1&2, and in Numeracy and Literacy, well above the average for schools like ourselves. They are included in this Goldie.

NZSS Orienteering Champs

Lani stayed on in Blenheim after the NZ Rogaine Champs (story previous page) to compete at the NZSS Orienteering Champs.

The Long distance was held on steep exposed hill country just south of Blenhiem while the Sprint the following day was held around the CBD. Lani was in intermediate girls (year 10 & 11, running on orange level maps).

"The courses were *runners courses,* meaning they were pretty easy without much nav, which kinda sucked.

I came away with a 5th in the Long which I was pretty happy with and 11th for the Sprint. The Senior Girls courses looked far more interesting!"

GBHS Cross Country 2023 Friday 4th August from 1.40pm to 3pm

(Championship race expected to start at 1.45pm)

There are two events open to all students:

1. CHAMPIONSHIP: a 5km course that takes about 25-60mins to run. This is the competitive and adventurous course which is suitable for those that will push themselves for maximum house points and placings. The championship event will also be for those runners looking to take out the top Junior, Intermediate or Senior awards. **SIGN-UP**

WILL BE REQUIRED for this event. Students can sign-up with their Form or PE teacher.

2. FUN RUN: a 3.2km loop that can be run or walked and can be completed in 15-60mins (depending on whether participants choose to walk or run). This is a scenic course that is suitable for all students to experience the best bits of the school cross country. To be eligible for house points in this event runners and walkers must be in house

colours. SIGN-UP IS NOT required for this event.

Both events start and finish on the school field and circumnavigate Birch Hill and cross neighbouring paddocks.

Appropriate running/ walking footwear is compulsory. No bare feet.

Students are expected to:

- 1. Respect the private land that we are using for the event
- 2. Stick to the race course
- 3. Participate within the spirit of our GBHS House events

Any behavioural concerns of any student prior to the event may jeopardise their chances of participating in this event.

- Participate within the spirit of our GBHS House events


Championship Race - 4.75 KM

- Starts at 1:35pm
- Follows around the school field; towards Birch Hill; circumnavigates clockwise TWICE around Birch Hill and returns to school

Fun Run / walk - 3.2km

- Starts at 1:50pm
- Same as Championship race but circumnavigates clockwise ONCE around Birch Hill and returns to school

Marshal Points:

- 1. ROTOTAI CROSSING
- 2. THE CONNECTOR
- 3. THE CLIMB
- 4. THE HIGH POINT (cut off point)
- 5. FENCE JUMP
- 6. GIANT STEP
- 7. STEEP DROP
- 8. ROCK GARDEN
- 9. BIRCH HILL GREEN
- 10. THE SWITCHBACKS
- 11. FENCE GAP

The course is well marked and there are teachers in hi-vis who are marshalling the event at the points indicated above. There will also be several teachers running the course and supporting the students.

At several points on the course there will be radios and first aid kits.

There will also be support vehicles on parts of the course.

As we are running through farmland, all electric fences will be switched off and cows moved away from the course.






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PR 3 - Cumulative Results by Percentage
