BoT decision on cell phone ban
We received 119 responses to
the parent/whānau survey.
90% were in favour of the ban,
7% were against it and 3%
unsure. I also spoke to a
number of students in their form classes.

At its meeting on Monday night, the Board voted unanimously in favour of the following motions:

- 1.That the BoT ban use of cell phones for years 7-11, between 8.50am and 3.00pm from the start of 2024.
- 2.That the procedural details of the cell phone ban, including consequences, be determined and managed by School Leadership.

HOD Māori appointed

Matua Anaru Mikaere has been appointed as HOD Māori and he will be starting in Term 1 2024. Anaru is a teacher at Christchurch Boys' High School and has experience teaching Te Reo to Year 13.

Bird Masks

Year 9 Resistant Materials Technology (RMT) class, second rotation, did a bird mask creation with teacher Georgina West. The idea was to choose a NZ bird to base their mask ideas on and try to express their character in it and include some Kowhaiwhai design element in it.

The learning objective was learning to 'steam bend MDF', 'spot welding sheet metal', 'using fixtures' such as rivets and screws and PVA glue, and working with 'plastics'.

Getting familiar with the design process and learning drawing techniques such as orthographic and isometric drawings.

Learning to use hand tools such as a metal nibbler and jigsaw along with the band saw, linisher, sander and metal bender.

Also a daring rafting excursion on the Buller River, alongside NMIT second-year students. Thanks again to Tracy Holland for being one of the drivers.














We want to say a

GOLDEN BAY HIGH SCHOOL DRESS CODE – NO UNIFORM


This dress code applies to all students who have permission to not wear uniform. This applies to Year 12, Year 13, on a student's birthday and designated non uniform days. Students should be practically and economically dressed in a manner that allows students and parents some choice whilst feeling comfortable and confident within themselves. The choice of clothing should be neat, clean and appropriate for both school life and everyday work.

AIMS OF GUIDELINES

To ensure safety, to prevent clothing giving offence, and to clarify expectations of appropriateness for everyday work.

GUIDELINES:

- 1. Clothing will not carry offensive messages or pictures, or slogans relating to alcohol and other drugs.
- 2. Footwear must be worn.
- 3. Clothing and jewellery must be safe for the environment in which it will be worn.
- 4. Clothing permitted:
 - a. Trousers/jeans
 - b. Shorts/skirts/dresses which cover upper legs
 - c. Tops which:
 - i. Cover shoulders, back and chest. An example is a T-shirt
 - ii. Are tucked in or reach lower than the top of the trousers/jeans/shorts/skirt
 - iii. Cannot be seen through.



Blake Inspire

Blake Inspire is a five day programme aimed at educating and furthering the experiences and knowledge of those passionate for the environment. I applied to join Blake Inspire at the beginning of this year and was accepted along with 139 other people.

We were split into four groups set at different times and places throughout the year. The group I was in (around 30 people) was based in Auckland at the Millenium. There was so much jam packed into this course and I could talk about it for literally days on end.

Amongst the many experiences that I had, my favourite part of the trip was when we visited the predator free island Tiritiri Matangi. We got to see Takahe, penguins and many other native New Zealand flora and fauna up close and learnt so much about the island's environment.
