Farewelling Matua Eric (Ngāti Ranginui, Ngāti Porou, Tainui) has been a deeply sad and difficult process for our rangatahi and staff. Matua was so well loved within the school and it is hard to describe the hole he is leaving in so many hearts. Matua was the kaitiaki of the Poutama Program at our kura; he led our students in their Waka Ama journeys; he was the rangatira of all things te ao Māori within our staff and he ran the Māori Department, alongside Elli Yates, teaching Years 7-13 Māori Studies this year. He was a kaiako of raranga, mau rākau and taonga pūoro. He shared his mātauranga freely but always with the utmost mana - he defined manaakitanga. When we think of this value, all we need to do is call Matua Eric to mind.

To mark these sad weeks of grief, we have gathered some mihi from students for their beloved kaiako. We have collected a selection of voices from students across year levels. These are by no means all the voices, but an example of the depth of love we have for him within our kura.

Matua would be touched to know how important he was to these rangatahi, in particular those whose life trajectories he made a major impact on. We share these personal reflections with you in honour of the imprint Matua Eric made on the lives of our precious rangatahi.

Kia ora ano e hoa ma,

We first met 14 years ago at NMIT – we happened to sit next to each other at a course and when we rose, we did so as friends. My hesistancy about speaking today is around not knowing if I can eloquently find the right combination of words to put together to pay any justice to how important you are, to me, to our rangatahi, to Mieke, to your whānau, loved ones and friends, to this community – you are so deeply loved by us all.

Matua, you were my best friend at mahi and one of my closest friends outside – we saw each other everyday and we always shared a bone crushing hug, a korero, a laugh, sometimes a mutual frustration and always a genuiune awhi and aroha for each other. We shared stories of students both past and present and you were always full of pride and joy for them regardless of their struggles or situations. You were a champion of te ao Māori and showed nothing but patience and kindness as I clumsily started to learn te reo – gently correcting me with a smile and a nudge. Going to mahi will never be the same again without you and I am so so sad that you are gone from this world.

One of the things I deeply admired about you was your ability to keep on your own pathway regardless of obstacles, challenges or popular opinions— sometimes you became frustrated when a wonderful solution seemed to be just right there and you weren't able to move in that direction. You always wanted the absolute best for others and in the face of adversity or resistance, you kept your head up, your heart open and you kept paddling forward with the hope that with time and a bit of reflection, others would come along with you. In your waka, there was always room for everybody. You stayed true to course powered by your values, aroha and belief in the goodness of people.

It was deeply important for you to foster a safe place for rangatahi to thrive and to have authetic sustainable connections with others — whakawhanautanga, manaakitanga and kaitiakitanga were at the heart of all of your movements. You deeply listened to understand and your way of communicating was poetic, metaphoric and rich in nuances, pūrākau and tikanga. Your inside and your outside matched perfectly and you were consistently respectful, showed humility and always moved lightly and with clarity, aware of others wairua.

How lucky I am, how lucky we all are to have been blessed with your goodness, your humor, your smile, your heart, your integrity, your courage, your wisdom and your drive to be tika – to go the right way. While I haven't had the privilege of knowing a lot of good men, Matua Eric, you have been one of the very best.

It has been my great privilege to have been Matua Eric's colleague for the last 4 years. He worked Monday to Thursday as a kaiārahi at our kura with two main roles. He taught and supported Māori classes including Te Reo and Waka, and he was the tutor for our Poutama programme.

In this room there are Rangatahi whose lives have been turned around under Matua's support and guidance in that Poutama programme. Rangatahi with qualifications, with an apprenticeship, on positive pathways. He walked with them and their whānau over rocky roads, carrying their bags at times but never compromising values and tikanga.

We all know that Matua loved Waka Ama. What many here may not know is that there are NCEA Waka Ama credits students can gain. However, not everyone is permitted to teach and assess Waka Ama. Matua completed a series of very frustrating and bureaucratic assessments himself so that he gained the required 'consent to assess'. Although he hated the paperwork, he did it for our Rangatahi. Sitting here today are students gaining NCEA Waka credits. Eric and I were both excited about a more intense Waka pathway planned for senior students next year.

I cannot do justice to Matua's contribution to our kura in these few moments, but I promise we will carry on with our journey of learning Reo, of following tikanga and of living through our values of manaakitanga, whanaungatanga, kaitiakitanga and wairuatanga.

Matua Eric, we are devastated by your passing. We extend so much aroha to your whānau.
